
# ANNUAL SRCC POTLUCK & ELECTION

Looking for some fun volunteer work? Want to meet more neighbors? Interested in what's happening around and in our area? We have many volunteer jobs available! Here are some open positions:

*Neighborhood Watch/Safety Chair:* Receive training from city on neighborhood watch program, train neighbors to do patrols. Coordinate patrol block captains and make sure there is one in each area. Be the point-person for this committee, communicate any activities to SRCC officers, and provide any short updates to members at general meetings.

*Communications Chair:* Proactively push out content via social media, and main-

tain website and Monthly Review email system. Newsletter Editor/ *Coordinator:* Oversee production of newsletter. help create story ideas and assign writers, keep production on schedule, proofread and edit, and be the contact person with the printer to confirm costs, schedules, etc. Area Coordinator (for Area 2): Recruit block captains to deliver newsletters to every residence in your area, maintain a contact sheet and provide updates to Newsletter Delivery Coordinator or VP, pick up newsletter and deliver to Block Captains, email the Newsletter Coordinator/VP

## Redevelopment Planned for The Heights on Congress

The Heights on Congress is a 10 acre apartment complex south of Oltorf that has 172 affordable units. The owner of the property, Doug Gurkin, and his representatives met with SRCC Area 5 representatives in December to present their initial plans to redevelop the property, which was built in the 1970's, into new affordable units and a luxury development. Mr. Gurkin has owned the property for almost two decades and owns another property in the Bouldin neighborhood, Oak Creek Village, that was recently redeveloped. Marty Christman, SRCC **Environmental Committee** Co-chair and Elloa Mathews, Area 5 Co-Coordinator, toured the property along with neighbor and landscape architect John Gleason. The owner reported that he has completed a survey of the many heritage oak trees on the

property, and that a few were in bad condition. The engineer for the project provided the group with a survey of the property which shows a current impervious cover of 60%. The site is zoned CS (Commercial Services) which allows 95% impervious cover and the owner plans to apply for MF6 (Multi-Family Zoning), which also allows 80% impervious cover. In addition to building new four-story units to maintain the existing 172 currently affordable units, the owner wants to add a luxury tower with 300 units on the north side of the property.

There was a discussion of the necessity of a traffic study, but their representatives stated that a traffic study wasn't required by the city. Also discussed was the owner's desire for the entrance to the property to be realigned to meet Cumberland

Road, across Congress Ave and the City's recommendation that the property have access to St. Edward's Drive for emergency vehicles. The property's southeastern corner backs up to single family homes on Carnarvon, and the dead end of St. Edward's Drive, the location for the future St. Edwards **Police Department** headquarters. This project has many issues related to its location next to a correctional facility, traffic, affordability, height, and runoff. Representatives from Austin Interfaith, and Travis Heights Elementary School whose students live at the Heights, have been invited to the discussion to ensure that the neighborhood gets a good project, and that students aren't displaced from Travis Heights in the redevelopment. Reports on this project will be posted on the SRCC meeting agenda.

The intent of the ad hoc committee is to update the bylaws to reflect improved practices that have been operating successfully in recent years. Items currently on the agenda include:

1) Add the current Finance Committee to the list of standing committees, and clarify its responsibilities for financial policies and procedures.

2) Review the standing committees and discuss their relevance to SRCC's needs. 3) Add references to SRCC's use of secure online cloud based tools for storing records and documents of SRCC business, providing access to documents for collaboration, and preserving our organizational history. 4) Discuss expanding Executive Committee to include committee chairs and representatives. 5) Identify language that is

inconsistent or ambiguous.

The first monthly meeting was held 1/22/16. The committee will meet monthly, consider issues, and not rush to meet an arbitrary deadline. Meeting agendas and minutes will be available to the SRCC General Membership. Recommendations will be presented to the Executive Committee. # SRCC Parks Update

#### Stacy Park Playfield Stormwater Controls

The City Watershed Protection Department (WPD) has teamed up with PARD to correct chronic erosion of the Stacy Park trail at the western approach to the wooden pedestrian bridge that connects the elementary school and the park playfield areas. WPD designed a solution and recently completed construction of a set of improvements that are intended to divert playfield runoff that normally drains over the trail on its course to the creek, and promote water infiltration into the drainage layers that underlie the playfield. Recently completed improvements include a system of shallow earthen berms and new playfield turf that was enhanced to promote soil infiltration. When finally established, most of the playfield runoff will find its way (below ground) to the creek through natural alluvial formations into the creek channel. Note: the playfields lie on a floodplain terrace of Blunn Creek. Floodplain terraces typically have alluvial soils that were deposited by flooding and often contain layers of well-draining rock and soils.

Clayton Ernst, city engineer, says, "Active construction is complete, including decompaction and amendment of existing site soil, construction of berms to promote infiltration, and installation of new grass sod onto the field. The project is now entering the Establishment Phase, during which time the field will remain closed to allow the sod to grow without disturbance. All trails are open. We anticipate opening the field up for use by late spring/early summer.'

Mr. Ernst also notes, "We

are aware of the persistent ponding that has occurred behind the berms along the trail. We are closely monitoring the ponding behavior to determine if there is any improvement in drawdown time during the establishment period. The problem will be fixed if performance does not improve, and we have several solutions in mind."

#### Little Stacy Park Improvement Project

This project to improve Little Stacy Park is being implemented through PARD's Capital Improvement Program. The project anticipates improvements to correct erosion issues, comply with accessibility standards, address maintenance, and provide a more enjoyable and inclusive play experience. The city has hired contracting firm, Asakura Robinson, to create the new design. The project is in the community input stage where community stakeholders have been sharing their thoughts and ideas regarding improvements to park areas like the tennis courts, wading pool, and playground. Thus far, the project team has held three public meetings, in addition to presenting at two SRCC meetings, using feedback to adjust their design sketches accordingly. Next, the consultants will create a more firm, detailed design plan and begin phase one of the improvements. Proposed improvements include: resurfacing the tennis courts, adding rain gardens, improving the basketball court, adding a

hillside slide, replacing some out-of-code play equipment with nature play-based materials, and making improvements to the entrances and the shelter house. ### Heritage Oaks Park

Great progress has been made in Heritage Oaks Park (HOP). The installation of trails, benches, and picnic tables is complete. The beauty and special topography of the site is enhanced by the positioning of benches for the best views and shade. The next phase of the grant work will focus on re-vegetation to stop erosion along the trail, containment of bamboo, and protection of a no-grow pond area. Support from Austin Parks Foundation and PARD was very positive in recognizing the value and unique characteristics of HOP. They also expressed appreciation for contributions made by the SRCC neighborhood residents, and volunteers to the project. APF has walked the site with SRCC representatives Carol Martin (who administered the grant), and David Todd, Chair of SRCC Parks Committee. All agree it has been a successful project. The neighbors have responded positively with a few comments:

"We have added the trail to our local jogging routine." "Our family lives right on the park and I can't tell you how happy we are about it. Our four-year-old and his friends get to ride their bikes on the path"

"I like the sloping path, the benches and the picnic tables. All were well placed and they made excellent use of the space. We've taken guests on short walks to the park, stood at the crest of the hill and enjoyed the view, especially viewing sunsets from the heritage oaks on the knoll."
