Update on the Proposed Land Development Code Revision

Your voice matters! Thanks to our dedicated, strategic committee members and the hundreds of other volunteers across the urban core advocating for your property rights, we won an important victory over the proposal to force landowners in transition zones to have to rebuild 6 units on their single-family lot. Please see this Sept 26 update from City staff (from the City of Austin Land Development Code Revision <u>Blog</u>):

"If a single-family home is intentionally demolished, limit rebuilds to house-scale multi-unit structures (i.e., two or more units) that conform with the purpose of the transition area zones. In response to community concerns, staff re-evaluated the original proposal. The new proposal is to allow complete rebuilds of existing single-family homes within transition areas regardless of whether the original structure was intentionally demolished. Only if a single-family use is expanded to include two or more housing units, consistent with the requirements of transition area zoning, would future single-family use of the property be prohibited. This proposal relies on increased housing unit capacity and market conditions to incrementally further Council's goal of encouraging more "missing middle" housing options along transit corridors. It goes further than staff's original proposal in protecting the rights of existing single-family homeowners, while also planning for the future."

There is still much work to do, such as analyze a proposed increase in impervious cover from 45% to 50% in the transition zones, which cover a great deal of homes in 78704. SRCC Considers Change to Meeting Location and Day

Proposed Location: Good Shepherd On The Hill, 1700 Woodland Ave, Austin, TX 78741

Key advantages include: a convenient location with ample, free, on-site parking (approximately 30-35 spaces), including handicapped parking with overflow street parking nearby, and a ground-floor meeting venue

providing easy accessibility.

Proposed Day and Time: Second Tuesdays of the month at 7pm

Key advantages include: an earlier start time, the ability to hold the annual potluck and elections on the same night as the regular meetings, and no meetings on Labor Day.

SRCC has formed an ad-hoc committee to explore this possibility, and collect input from neighbors. Good Shepherd on the Hill

If you've ever headed east on Woodland Ave toward I-35, as the sun is setting behind the tree line of Travis Heights, perhaps you've noticed the year-round, Christmas light ornamentation atop the grassy hill in the distance that spells out "LOVE." If you have, you have seen Good Shepherd on the Hill. Good Shepherd on the Hill, or "The Hill" as it is often called, is a church plant of The Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, whose historic main campus is located in Tarrytown in West Austin. The Hill came into existence in 2015, after Good Shepherd set aside money from their building campaign to begin ministry in another part of Austin, and in that four years, The Hill has sought to be a beacon of "LOVE" in the East Travis Heights community and beyond.

The church centers its common life around Holy Communion on Sunday mornings, but has also looked for ways to be a vital part of the neighborhood Monday through Saturday. Tutoring and chess clubs in nearby apartment complexes, blood drives, neighborhood yard sales, weekly yoga, discussion groups, and a monthly concert series bring people together from all over Austin around common interests. The Hill has also opened its green space, designated "THE PARK AT LOVE HILL" for the enjoyment of all, and in the cooler evenings, dogs of all breeds dot the hill, as well as disc golfers throwing a quick round. Additionally, the "Opportunity Gardens," allow people to learn and share in planting and caring for food crops. Currently, the fall gardens are being readied for planting, and we're looking forward to a bountiful harvest.

Another part of the building campaign was the creation of a full-day, year-round preschool, to help address Austin's decreasing availability of early childhood education. For the past year and a half, Hillside Early Childhood Center has provided nurturing love and learning to infants through pre-K students. Through their play-based curriculum, Hillside has created a space of thoughtful exploration and loving happiness that continues to grow and prosper.

Good Shepherd on the Hill is teeming with life and activity designed for the betterment of our community. If you're ever curious about what's happening at The Hill, feel free to stop in for a cup of coffee, the Rev. Kathy Pfister or Sam Hensley would love to chat, and share the "LOVE" they have for this community with you.

Outline of the South River City Citizens' Position 2019 Regarding Proposed Land Use Code Revision

1. SHADES OF TRANSITION ZONES

We agree that the City should allow for more housing density along the corridors of Congress Avenue, Riverside, IH-35, Ben White Boulevard, and on parcels already identified in the *SRCC Neighborhood Plan*.

However, the proposed application of transition zoning to single-family houses in close-in neighborhoods unfairly targets some homeowners. All neighborhoods in Austin should share equally in the responsibility for providing more affordable housing units.

2. NEIGHBORHOOD PLANS ARE PART OF AUSTIN'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

We agree with the reference to Neighborhood Plans, which have been carefully and thoughtfully worked out over long periods of time, and in many cases voted on by a majority of residents. Neighborhood Plans are adopted by City ordinances and are still in force.

However, we disagree with proposed maps that ignore Neighborhood Plans. Although we recognize that we need more density along corridors (see point 1), the neighborhoods themselves should help the city locate them since they know the areas best.

3. PRESERVATION / DEMOLITION

We agree with The Imagine Austin Plan, which advises that comprehensive urban planning and design should protect historic areas and help maintain neighborhood character.

However, McMansion FAR limits are not sufficient to discourage the extensive demolition of residences within the central neighborhoods. Preservation incentives, such as more flexibility in regard to ADUs coupled with greater density rather than new development, are a positive step and another tool to avoid extensive demolitions.

4. FLOODING AND THE ENVIRONMENT

We agree with the proposed zoning changes' goal to address environmental concerns, such as a decrease in total impervious cover, especially in light of the vulnerability of SRCC neighbors to flooding, according to post Atlas 14 floodplain definitions.

However, developers often remove trees that prevent erosion & decrease temperatures. These trees add to the property values, and we have the right to rigorously protect our property values in the State of Texas. The current infrastructure, such as water, wastewater, and utilities, likely would not support the proposed increase in density. The City of Austin cannot afford litigation expenses if property owners sue for damage suffered because of overdevelopment. Development should not result in downstream flooding.

5. AFFORDABILITY

We agree that Austin needs more Affordable Housing, especially close to large employers to help cut our traffic congestion. People earning 50-60% Median Family Income, including many government, nonprofit, academic, small business, service workers and young professionals flee our city because of lack of affordability. SRCC has numerous affordable units in older homes, ADUs, and multifamily homes today.

However, we disagree with fee-in-lieu alternative for developers who receive greater entitlements in exchange for community benefits. 20% of the units should be on-site affordable housing, and other developments such as boardwalks and climbing walls should not be considered an alternative to building on-site affordable housing.

6. COMPATIBILITY

We agree that we may need to increase height on the corridors in order to attain more housing.

However, we believe that we should retain compatibility standards within the neighborhoods in order to retain the character, decrease congestion, and increase safe walkability.

7. PUBLIC ACCESS TO DECISION MAKING

We agree that public access to the LDCR process and final product is necessary and appropriate. There are three periods in which public input should be maximized. These periods are 1) owner access to City staff regarding personal lots; 2) access to the City Planning Commission review of the revisions; and 3) City Council meeting on revisions.

However, we believe that decision-making should rely on accurate, transparent data, presented in a timely fashion for public input and approval.

Project Connect Coming to our Neighborhood

Capitol Metro's Project Connect has proposed two transit routes, the Orange and the Blue Lines, which will cross SRCC. The Blue Line will follow Riverside Drive from the Airport, across Lady Bird Lake between I-35 and Congress Avenue to The University of Texas campus and possibly to Austin Community College Highland campus. The Orange Line will use Congress Avenue from Slaughter Lane to Tech Ridge, with stops near St. Ed's University and South Congress. The Orange and Blue Lines will intersect near Congress and Riverside, also in our neighborhood. South Congress Parking Strategy
